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

Recommendations for Travelers: Current Measles and VHF Activity

Travel has always been associated with potential risks to the health of travelers. The recent activity of measles and viral hemorrhagic fever (VHF) highlight the importance of routinely asking if a patient has travelled, to what location(s) and in what activities he/she participated. The answers to these questions will provide valuable information regarding potential exposures to infectious diseases, assist with prompt diagnosis, allow appropriate treatment and prevent or limit the spread of disease.

Measles: Canada has been free of endemic measles since 1998; however, measles occurs globally and remains a serious and common disease in many countries. In Ontario, importation and travel-related cases still occur and have contributed to further transmission among populations without immunity.



Between 2009 and 2012, 27 confirmed cases were reported in Ontario, of whom, 25 were directly or indirectly associated with travel outside of Canada. As of March 31, 2014, 11 cases of measles have been reported in Ontario, of whom, all were directly or indirectly associated with travel to the Philippines, Thailand and Europe. Ebola Virus Disease – West Africa: The Ministry of Health of Guinea has notified the World Health Organization of a rapidly evolving outbreak of Ebola Virus Disease (EVD) in the country. As of March 28, 2014, a total of 112 confirmed and suspected cases including 70 deaths have been reported in Guinea. This includes six health care workers -- 4 confirmed and 2 suspected cases. Further reports of suspected cases in border areas of Liberia and Sierra Leone are being investigated. In addition, recent attention has focused on a Saskatchewan resident who was suspected of having EVD. He was a returning traveler who presented with clinically compatible signs and symptoms; however, all VHFs have since been ruled out.

Availability of Combined Measles, Mumps, Rubella, Varicella (MMRV) Vaccine

Please be aware that MMRV (Priorix-Tetra®) vaccine is currently unavailable from Ontario Government Pharmaceutical and Medical Supply Service (OGPMSS).

For the upcoming months your order for MMRV vaccine will be automatically replaced. Each package of MMRV vaccine (10 doses/package) will be replaced by:

- one package of MMR vaccine (10 doses/package); and
- one package varicella vaccine (10 doses/package).

New supply of MMRV vaccine is expected to become available in May 2014.

Important Information for Immunizers – Panorama is Coming!

The Health Unit will be moving towards the implementation of Panorama, a provincial initiative leading to a provincial immunization database/registry. Eventually, this system will be implemented throughout Canada and it will replace today's paper-based "yellow card."

The Health Unit has been scheduled to implement Panorama during the summer of 2014, just as the new changes to the Immunization of School Pupils' Act (ISPA) come into effect. The ISPA will now require proof of immunization against three additional designated diseases for school attendance. The three new diseases are: meningococcal disease, pertussis, and varicella. Proof of immunization for the new designated diseases will come into effect on July 1, 2014. The exemption forms will also be more user-friendly and available online.

Infectious Diseases Experts Issue Guidance on Healthcare Personnel Attire Recommendations to help prevent healthcare-associated infections transmitted through clothing

New guidance from the Society for Healthcare Epidemiology of America (SHEA) provides recommendations to prevent transmission of healthcare-associated infections through healthcare personnel (HCP) attire in non-operating room settings. The guidance was published online in the February 2014 issue of *Infection Control and Hospital Epidemiology*, the journal of the SHEA, along with a review of patient and healthcare provider perceptions of HCP attire and transmission risk, suggesting professionalism may not be contingent on the traditional white coat.

"While studies have demonstrated the clothing of healthcare personnel may have a role in transmission of pathogens, the role of clothing in passing infectious pathogens to patients has not yet been well established," said Gonzalo Bearman, MD,



MPH, a lead author of the study and member of SHEA's Guidelines Committee. "This document is an effort to analyze the available data, issue reasonable recommendations, define expert consensus, and describe the need for future studies to close the gaps in knowledge on infection prevention as it relates to HCP attire."

The authors outlined the following practices to be considered by individual facilities:

- **1. "Bare below the elbows" (BBE):** Facilities may consider adopting a BBE approach to inpatient care as a supplemental infection prevention policy; however, an optimal choice of alternate attire, such as scrub uniforms or other short sleeved personal attire, remains undefined. BBE is defined as wearing of short sleeves and no wristwatch, jewelry, or ties during clinical practice.
- **2. White Coats:** Facilities that mandate or strongly recommend use of a white coat for professional appearance should institute one or more of the following measures:
 - a. HCP should have two or more white coats available and have access to a convenient and economical means to launder white coats (e.g. on site institution provided laundering at no cost or low cost).
 - b. Institutions should provide coat hooks that would allow HCP to remove their white coat prior to contact with patients or a patient's immediate environment.

3. Laundering:

- **a. Frequency:** Optimally, any apparel worn at the bedside that comes in contact with the patient or patient environment should be laundered after daily use.
- **b.** Home laundering: If HCPs launder apparel at home, a hot water wash cycle (ideally with bleach) followed by a cycle in the dryer or ironing has been shown to eliminate bacteria.
- 4. HCP footwear: All footwear should have closed toes, low heels, and non-skid soles.
- 5. Shared equipment including stethoscopes should be cleaned between patients.
- 6. No general guidance can be made for prohibiting items like lanyards, identification tags and sleeves, cell phones, pagers, and jewelry, but those items that come into direct contact with the patient or environment should be disinfected, replaced, or eliminated.

If implemented, the authors recommend that all practices be voluntary and accompanied by a well-organized communication and education effort directed at both HCP and patients.

In their review of the medical literature, the authors noted that while patients usually prefer formal attire, including a white coat, these preferences had little impact on patient satisfaction and confidence in HCPs. Patients did not tend to perceive the potential infection risks of white coats or other clothing, however when made aware of these risks, patients seemed willing to change their preferences of HCP attire.
