Board of Health Meeting Summary

September 12, 2012



Introductions: New Board of Health Member

The recently elected Chief of Curve Lake First Nation <u>Phyllis Williams</u> was introduced as the Board of Health's newest member. She has a great deal of past experience working in the health and social services field, and formerly served as the Manager of Health Services at Curve Lake. She is replacing long-time Board of Health member former chief, Keith Knott.

Day in the Life – Sewage Inspector

Public Health Inspector Kathleen Shepherd provided an overview of a typical day in her role with the <u>Sewage Inspection</u>

<u>Program.</u> She helps customers at the counter with sewage system permit applications, and spends most of her day in the field inspecting sewage disposal systems such as privies, leaching pits, cesspools, septic tank systems and holding tanks, and also handles complaints. She is responsible for ensuring building code guidelines are properly followed when sewage systems are installed, and issues permits once compliance is ensured. The Health Unit is the agency responsible for privately-owned sewage systems in the County and City of Peterborough.

Q2 2012 Program Report

Larry Stinson, Director of Public Health Programs, presented the compliance status of Health Unit programs according to the Ontario Public Health Standards for the first half of 2012. He noted that the Health Unit is compliant in most program areas, and partially compliant in areas where there is limited capacity due to chronic underfunding and staff reductions. He also reported that the Health Unit's program activity performance was on track for all indicators required by the Accountability Agreement.

Q2 2012 Financial Report

Brent Woodford, Director of Corporate Services, reported on the Health Unit's financial position for the second quarter. All program areas are on track according to the 2012 budget for this point in the year.

Cuts to Social Assistance Benefits: A Public Health Perspective

Health Promoter Christine Post provided a comprehensive overview on the expected impact of cuts to provincial social assistance benefits programs, including Discretionary Benefits, the Community Start Up and Maintenance Benefit, and the Home Repairs Benefit. The 2012 Ontario provincial budget removed approximately \$133 million annually from benefits to people on social assistance. In Peterborough, this means 2013 Discretionary Benefits will be cut from \$1.95 million to \$924,000. Loss of funding to discretionary benefits will reduce the ability of social assistance clients to access Health Unit supports, such as dental services and food security programs. Limited Incomes: A Recipe for Hunger

Dr. Rosana Pellizzari presented the annual Nutritious Food Basket report entitled <u>Limited Incomes: A Recipe for Hunger</u>. This report shows how Peterborough's most vulnerable residents continue to suffer from an inability to choose to eat nutritiously based on current food costs. Each May, Health Unit Nutritionists price out local food costs required to provide a basic nutritious diet. These costs are compared to a variety of income scenarios to determine affordability. The report noted that local food prices have increased 6.5% over the past two years; however, the issue is not the cost of food, but that incomes are too low. With ten percent of local households experiencing food insecurity, Dr. Pellizzari described the situation as a public health crisis requiring the urgent attention and cooperation of all levels of government.

Indoor Tanning Beds

Councillor Lesley Parnell described the extensive work taking place in many municipalities to enact bylaws banning indoor tanning for youth under 18 years. She encouraged the Board of Health to request local municipalities to develop a similar bylaw. Dr. Pellizzari noted that tanning beds are considered a Class 1 carcinogen and there is precedent in Ontario for a municipality passing a similar by law. A proposal to enact provincial legislation banning tanning beds entitled the Skin Cancer Prevention Act will receive its second reading at Queen's Park in November.

Changes to Smoking By-Law in Peterborough re: Waterpipes

Councillor Parnell updated the board that City staff are amending the smoking bylaw to include reference to waterpipes to be brought forward to City Council in late October.
