

Infectious Disease & Immunization

Working together to prevent and control infectious diseases

Reducing the impact of infectious diseases requires the incredible collaboration of public health experts, healthcare providers, schools, longterm care facilities, and every family in our community. Our highly-trained team investigates and manages disease outbreaks, oversees the supply of vaccines, conducts ongoing surveillance, and prevents the spread of illness by immunizing residents of all ages. PPH also runs clinics for sexual health, travel health, and routine immunizations. **658** confirmed cases of sexually-transmitted & blood-borne infections managed by PPH 27,496 condoms distributed 100% of personal service settings were inspected for infection control **43** outbreaks investigated **5** mumps cases connected to a local outbreak **91%** of students were compliant with the Immunization of School Pupils Act
